## GENEALOGICAL TIPS:

When you find a father listed as the guardian of his oun child it means that the child has inheirted land and/or money from a grandparent and generally the maternal. grandparents. You will find guardianship records both in loose originals and in bound volumes in the Archives, also can be found in the court minutes.

Remember that the terms Sr. \& Ir. did not necissarily mean father and son in the past. It could refer to a grandfather-grandson, uncle-nephew as well as father-ion. Evel more confusing it could be used to refer to two men who were not related but were living in the same county. When this was the case it can be even more confusing when Sr. is younger than Ir.

DO REmEMBER TO RE-GEAR yOUR THINKING TO THE PAST RATHER THAN THE PRESENT AS THE terms and ways they are used have changed over the years.

Remember to go through the miscellaneous records file at the Archives for any count you are interested in. This classification was designed for records that did not fit into the other catagories. For instance it is here that you will find adoption records.

Do you have a genealogical hint that through trial and error or found it in anothen publication? If so we would like to have it to include in our publication.

## SOURCES:

Are you aware of the material available at the Lenoir Comminity College library? They have all N.C. census records, and also all Va. census through 1900. Many published books including the Moravian Records, and a computerized listing for many cemeteries in the county done by a history class at the college. Like our wcc library it is open to the public and they are open Mon-Thurs. nights till 9 p.m. close at 5 on Fridays.

Also in Kinston a good collection at the publick library and the Mormon Stake Librot For hours on the Stake Library we suggest that you call the local church for information

Greenville: The manuscript collection at the Joyner Library of East Carolina Univer sity continues to grow. Main emphasis of this collection is family records and research dealing with Eastern N.C. families. Additionally the library's genealogical collection is continuing to grow. Also the public library in Greenville has an excellent collection of genealogical material, including of out of print material on pitt county.

Goldsboro: In addition to the growing collection at the public library don't forget to check out the collection at wayne Community College. The two libraries are working together closely so that we can have little to no duplication of materials in the two libraries thereby doubling the amount of material available.

Raleigh: All of you are aware of the extensive collection of our State Archives, but have you checked out the holdings of N.C. State Univeristy? You will be in for a pleasant surprise.

Chapel Hill: The Graduate Library of UNC (the Louis Round Wieson Library) has two
special collections: The N.C. Collection, which deals soley with N.C. families and history and the Southern Historical Collection, which deals with Southern families and histories. Important to remember about this collection is that the thrust of this collection is material not found in the N.C. State Archives. Also a good collection in the genealogical section, dealing not only with N.C. families and histories but other areas of the country as well. This collection is only open $1 / 2$ day on Sat.

Durham: the collection at Duke University will surprise you. Many out of print books and peridocals, dealing not only with N.C. but other areas of the country. Also at Duke in the Divinity Library are records of the Methodist Church in N.C.

Smithfield: have you had the pleasure of visiting Margaret Lee in the Johnston County Room of the public library. If not you have missed something. We hope to see our local history room grow into this kind of collection. All census for the county have been indexed, newspapers are being abstracted, bible records and cemetery records pubeished, family histories collected. Go for a visit and you will have a great time.

Mount olive; Surprised you? A growing collection at the Mount olive College Library, some rare and out of print books. Call for the hours the collection is open.

If you are aware of a collection which we have left our please let us know and we will be glad to list it in the next issue.

How could I forget the Duplin County Historical Society Collection at Rose Hill. A real treat for anyone with Duplin and Sampson connections.
