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

## A REPORT TO THE MEMBERSHIP

1982 was a busy year for the Wayne County Historical Assoc. We promoted eight General Meetings and Programs, five in the first half of the year and three in the fall. All meetings were held in our newly acquired Town Meeting Hall (1981 objective). We were able to put the finishing touches to the Hall by summer which included restoration to the organ and new red carpeting for the aisles.

Our major objective for 1982 was the sponsoring of a new history book entitled THE HERITAGE OF WAYNE COUNTY. This was a joint venture with Old Dobbs Genealogical Society. This was a very successful and satisfying project, involving a large committee of twenty-five hard working people. Mary Johnstone was Chairman, Charlotte Carrere, coordinator, and Marvin Woodard, Treasurer. John Baxton Flower, wrote the history and more than two hundred people wrote their family history and the history of five hundred others who had contributed to the history and growth of the county. The Committee began work in January 1982, started delivering material to the printer in July and August. Over 600 copies were sold during the summer before the book was finished and delivered in November. To date approximately one-half of the 2000 book order has been sold and approximately one-half of the \$62,000 contract has been paid to the publishers.

The Directors held ten meetings during the year to discuss on-going projects, planning the meetings, and the future projects.

In 1981 our major project was the purchase and rehabilitating of the old Presbyteri Church, now our Meeting Hall. Another project was the promotion of establishing a Historic District by the City Aldermen. They appointed a Commission composed mostly of our Association members. Jim Vinson, our Vice President, is Chairman. The Commission has met once a month for ten months trying to complete an inventory star earlier plans. This requires a great deal of time to study each piece of property, work is progressing and will be continuing for some time.

Several members have become impatient with the progress of the Commission and have purchased and rehabilitated homes on their own.

The Association has started a Revolving Fund to aid in restoring and rehabilitating property in the Historic District. At present we have only \$7,200.00 in this fund and we need at least \$25,000.00 before we can be very active. We are sure our fund will grow as soon as the district becomes more real and the advantages more apparent

Old Waynesborough Park, our oldest incompleted project, was deeded to the State thre years ago. The State, due to the economy, has drug its feet on its promise to developed the park. They have let a contract to build a good road and entrance to the park and looks to be the major objective for 1983. Col. Ed Kelly (Rt) and now with Wayne Community College and also a director of Torhunta Boy Scout Council has agreed to he park in 1983 through the cooperative volunteerism of all interested parties - County City, State and Wayne County people.
