During more than 1,200 miles of travelling by car, after we had flown out there, we visited the small logging town of Shelton, Washington. The store building is still there but it is now a "rentall" business. Our house on Fine Street has been traded in for a new city government building; the elementary school is no more: the local library building now houses the new museum. We visited many places and saw many beautiful sites, including beautiful bit. Ranier in all of its glory, BUT the most exciting thing during. the entire trip was the inside of that small town, people-oriented MJSEUL: The first thing I saw when I walked in was a reference to my father's drug store. I felt that I absolutely had to have a copy. yeedless to say that before we left that day we were treated like long-lost relatives by the Director of the kuseum, bis. Billie Howard amd the Dason County Historical Society President, Dick Brewer. Ne were allowed in the "Inner sanctum" where all of the goodies are filed and allowed to puruse the vertical files of photos, letters, periodicals, and family papers. I was excited! Fy mother's family records were numerous. I saw a photo of my Uncle Jay Ransom and Charles immediately said "we have one of those". This uncle went on a 20,000 mile trip, visiting every state Governor, having his photo taken with his tr velling companions and the governor in front of each state Capitol -- in 1912 -- travelling on horseback: After we arrived home we discovered the photo Charles had referred to was taken in Boston. We were given coples of photos taken in Raleigh, N.C. and Columbia, S.C.

Needles to say I joined the Diason County Historical Society and look forward to exchanging many family history and genealogy papers. We have the oriminal Larriage Certificate for Jay Beech Ransom and his wife Aunt Lillian Seck who were married in 1898. It is a beautiful document, complete with photos of the bride and groom, and is in color. We have had color copies made to send out West. I am looking forward to what I might receive in return.

I enjoyed my family visits with both the living and the dead. I am still excited. It was like Christmas in Nay.

Our June meeting will be at the Western Sizzlin at 11:30.(26). I hope to see all of you there. The nominating committee will present a slate of officers for us to consider.

Guest speaker at the March meeting of Old Dobbs Genealogical Soc. was INDIAN CHIEF TOM CARTER of Sampson County. He heads the Coharie tribes of Sampson and Harnett Counties. He heads the Coharie Commission on Indian Affairs, a member of the advisory council of the State Board of Education on Indian education and is a retired educator.

Chief Carter was dressed in full Chieftain colorful ceremonial attire. His comments were informative and interesting. He spoke of the Indian influence on farming as well as hunting and fishing of early setters. He also stressed that native Indians were stewards of the earth and gave back as much as they received from the land. His comments were enjoyed by all in attendance.
