Benjamin SKINNER received some payment for "carrying provisions to the Army" @ Nov.- Dec. 1776. It was issued at Kinston, NC, although it is believed Benjamin lived in Dobbs Co. at the head of Falling Creek in what is now Greene Co. He was in Cheraws Dist. (now Darlington Co., SC) by 1786. The following article was sent to us by Mr. Marvin Woodard.

*"Dean's Meeting House"*

*The following statements are taken from an article entitled, "Introduction of Methodism into Wayne County, N. C.," which appeared in the North Carolina Advocate of February 29, 1856.*

*A few years after Bishop Asbury preached at the Watts home, a small log meeting house was built on the west side of Stoney Creek, and called "Dean's Meeting House." It was very crudely constructed of rough logs, with holes cut for a window and a door.*

*Some years later, the little group which had been formed at Dean's Meeting House, moved to Sarah Howell's, about two miles west, and near the present location of Salem Church.*

Recently a developer, Mr. Durwood F. Wiggins, who owns land along New Hope Road, and on the west side of Stoney Creek, contacted O. J. Howell, Jr., and stated that he had read the Salem Church history and had done some research into the land records of that area through his attorney, and that he was convinced that he had discovered "Dean's Meeting House." He indicated that he was developing the property on which it was located and that he would donate it to Salem if it could be moved expediently.

O. J. Howell, Jr. and Marvin Woodard visited the cabin and brought it to the attention of several other members of the Salem men's organization, including the pastor, Rev. Randy Blanchard.

Considerable interest and enthusiasm was expressed by those who visited the cabin, and on September 2, 1987 the matter was presented to the Administrative Board of Salem. A committee was formed with O. J. Howell, Jr. and Marvin Woodard as co-chairmen, with members William Barnes, Lemuel Bartlett, I. J. Mazingo and Ted Tillman to consider the feasibility of moving the building to Salem property. After further consideration and investigation a proposal to move the building to Salem was presented to the Administrative Board on September 13th. The proposal was approved, and on September 14, 1987 "Dean's Meeting House", which some two hundred years ago served as a meeting place for early families of Salem, was moved to Salem property. The move was done by Harrell's House Moving Co. of Mt. Olive, Mr. Jimmy Harrell, owner.

It is planned that as time, talent, materials and funds are available it can be restored as nearly as possible to its original condition of about 1786, and that it, along with other Salem edifices, will symbolize over two hundred years of progress and service to the Salem community.

The following census records of Stewart County, Georgia were submitted to us by Mrs. Frances Deans because she feels that a great many of the people on it very likely came from Wayne Co. NC. She has given us the records for 1830 through 1850. I will try to publish all of them in consecutive newsletters, trying to complete one year in each newsletter.

The original census records for Georgia of 1830 are on file in the Bureau of Census, National Archives, Washington DC in Georgia Volume 17, pages 241 through 249. After careful study by a Randolph County official in 1956, it appeared that persons listed on pages 245 & 246 lived in that part of the county that remained as Randolph County, and the persons listed on the other pages were in the part that became Stewart County.

The record here indicates whether two families living in the same house are living as one family or as two separate families. The first number beside the name of the head of family given below indicates the number of persons living in the household. The second number indicates the number of slaves.

This material on the census records of Stewart County, Georgia are donated by Frances Lynch Deans who traced one of her Lynch lines to this County. In looking through the census records, she found many people who had left North Carolina and settled in Stewart Co. She felt this information might be of value to others.

Frances Great, Great, great Grandfather Cornelius Lynch had a brother named Arthur Lynch. It was Arthur's son, also named Cornelius who left Johnston County, N.C. in 1835 and set out for Georgia on horseback. It was a 600 mile trip he made in 18 days. He spent one night in Elbert County, Ga., where by chance he met up with John Grimes, son of John Grimes Sr. and Nancy. John Grimes Sr. lived in Stewart Co., but were formally of North Carolina. Young John was returning home after a visit to North Carolina on business for his father.

Upon their arrival in Stewart Co., Cornelius Lynch worked for John Grimes one year for \$5.00 a month. Then he worked for John Sr. a year or two. After this he worked for Kennedy Dennard five years and then the widow of Dennard. He first bought 100 acres of land near Singer Pond. In 1849 he purchased land in the 20th District from Rev. Zack Thomas. He owned one slave in 1850. Cornelius was a carpenter and a shoe maker and a farmer. He married first, Harriet Grimes in August 1838. She was the daughter of John Sr. and Nancy Grimes. He married after her death to Ruth Ann Thomas Sasser the widow of Bryant Sasser. He had several children by both marriages. Cornelius could not read nor write and thus lost contact with all his family back in Johnston Co. N.C. However, he must have been fond of those he left behind, because he named many of his children after them.

The original two room dog trot is still standing that Cornelius Lynch built in Stewart Co. and has been donated by his heirs to Westville, a replica of an 1800 small Georgia town, which is of interest. Frances has been to Stewart Co. and met with many of Cornelius descendants and they have in turn been to Wayne Co. and attended the Lynch Reunion.

We have the following information published by the Chemung County Historical Society of Elmira, New York in a booklet called LIST OF CONFEDERATE SOLDIERS Buried in Woodlawn Cemetery, Elmira, New York. They published the following short history of the Cemetery:

"In 1861 Elmira was a training and marshalling center for Union Soldiers. There were three camps with two hospitals and a large warehouse. As the barracks emptied it was decided to make use of the buildings as a prison camp. Here between July 1864 and August 1865 about 12,000 were confined at different times. Of these about 2,950 died. Many were in poor condition when they arrived. The first winter in camp was unusually severe which added to the large loss of life.

At first the United States Government made no provisions for the burial of prisoners so the city officials of Elmira gave the Commanding Officer permission to use one half acre in the city cemetery, known as Woodlawn. The half acre plot was soon filled and before the close of the camp two and one half acres had been used for the graves of Confederate soldiers.

As far as the records show, the Federal Government did nothing in the matter until 1877 when it paid the City of Elmira Fifteen Hundred Dollars for the two and one half acres, and named the plot Woodlawn National Cemetery. Since then more land has been added and many other veterans of United States wars are now buried there.

At the time of the Confederate burials, John Jones, an escaped slave who had found freedom in Elmira, was sexton of Woodlawn. He kept a meticulous record of each Confederate burial so that when, in 1907, the Federal Government erected a small marble marker at each grave, it was possible to mark each stone with the soldier's name, company regiment, date of death, and grave number.

Among the men whom John Jones buried was one from the household in which he had lived as a slave in Virginia.

An excellent book giving a complete history of the Elmira Prison Camp was written by Clay W. Holmes, is called 'The Elmira Prison Camp' and was published in 1912."

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There was a marker erected over the burial place of forty-nine Confederate soldiers who were killed in a railroad accident near Shohola, Pennsylvania while they were prisoners of war. They were buried there but later moved to Woodlawn Cemetery where the individual graves can no longer be identified.
