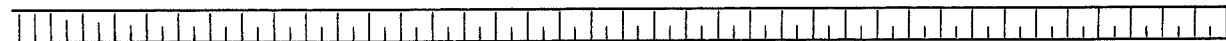

To the Honourable the General Assembly of the State of North Carolina.
The petition of George Jernigan Jr humbly Sheweth to your honourable body that when at the age of fourteen years he was Convicted of petty Larceny to which charge he thinks it unnecessary now to plead Innocence as the law of his country convicted him and Sentencted him to a few Stripes which he received he is now twenty Six years of age and has been honest and upright in his dealings with all his fellow Citizens ever Since his Conviction So far as our Knowledge extends or we have been able to get information at the time of his transgression he was young and ignorant and from the rectitude of his conduct Since that time we the Subscribers hope that the Legislature will restore him to credit with an expectation that he will be a useful Citizen as it would be a great gratification

to himself his wife and Children and a number of the respectable Citizens of the County.

Committee of Propositions and Grievances to whom was referred the petition in behalf of George Jernigan, praying that he may be restored to credit

Respectfully report

That it appears to your Committee that at the age of fourteen years George Jernigan of the County of Wayne was convicted of the crime of petty larceny, and sentenced to the punishment, the Law inflicts. It further appears, that he is now of the age of Twenty six years and that ever since his conviction he has demeaned himself properly, and is considered a usefull man in his neighborhood, that he is the husband of a respectable woman and the father of several children, it further appears that a number of respectable citizens of the County of Wayne, wish him restored to society--In consideration of which, and considering hia age at the time when the crime was comitted, & his good conduct ever since, your comittee is of opinion that he should be restored to credit, and recomend that accompanying Bill be passed into a Law.

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The Committee of Claims to whom was referred a Resolution instructing them to enquire into the expediency of allowing Bryan Kornegay, and Henry Kornegay of Duplin County, three hundred dollars, for the apprehension of Joseph Sollis, who stood indicted in said County, for the murder of Abram Kornegay---have had the same under Consideration, and respectfully report--

That the fact is as stated in the Resolution, but the Committee are of opinion, that in law, the parties in whose behalf this application is made are unquestionably not entitled to the remuneration, which they claim, nor do they believe that it is either expedient or politic to allow it, the Claimants had no right to look for it to the Legislature--the offer was voluntary on their part, and altho' their feelings, as Relations of the Murdered individual might have been more excited, yet they had no more authority to offer a reward in this case, than anyother individual--It is made the duty of the Governor, where a criminal escapes, and flies beyond the pursuit of justice, to offer a reward for his apprehension--But this was not the Case in this instance. From the relation in which the Citizen stands to Society, without any additional inducement it is his duty to aid and assist in bringing to Justice the perpetrators of crime--Allow however, this application and the ineventable effect will be that but few men will move in an affair of this kind, until a sufficient inducement, by way of reward, is held out to them--Criminals, of course, will frequently escape, and there will be no end to applications to the Legislature similar to this. For these reasons, the Committee recommend the adoption of the following resolution. Resolved that it is inexpedient to grant the prayer of the Petitioners.

To The Honourable The General Assembly of NO. Carolina
The Petition of Rebecca Newkirk Wife of Alexander Newkirk of the County of Duplin Humbly shewith That circumstances which in themselves are too painful for her to recount have driven her to this denier resort in praying that a law may be passed at your present Session securing to her such property and effects as she may hereafter acquire in such manner as will effectually prevent such property and Effects being subject or liable to the discharge or payment of any Debt heretofore contracted or that may be hereafter contracted by her Husband Alexander Newkirk. Your Petitioner though it wounds her very soul begs leave to state that when and at the time of her intermarrying with her said Husband, she was worth and in possession of a Good Property consisting of Land and Negroes the whole of which has since been sold to discharge her said Husbonds Debts, leaving a great amount yet unpaid & leaving your Petitioner with Three infant Children reduced to poverty and Wretchedness.

While your Petitioner thus entreats the Benevolence of the General Assembly as aforesaid she most honestly declares, that should she hereafter find herself able to discharge her said Husband's Debts without sacrificing her property or
