## CAREFUL RECORD-KEEPING; THE KEY TO EFFICIENT RESEARCH

In the tradition of my seottish ancestors, I like to spend the week between Chrigtmas and New Year's Day cleaning and organizing.

The organization of records geems to be an ever-present problem for most genealogists. Although thare are many different approaches that are workable, there is no system that is perfect.

Whether you use a computer system or a simple form of your own design, you should be able to tell easily (1) What information you already know; (2) The source of that information; and (3) The information that is still missing.

No matter how innovative your approach, it should be eastly understood by someone else. You will also want to have a record of sources that were checked with negative results to avoid later duplication.

One research afd that find particularly useful is an inexpensive threg-ring binder with lined loose-leaf pages. Identify your research problems by writing a single heading at the top of a blank page.

For example, I know that my Duncan famjly lived in Mills County, Iowa, from about 1875 until 1890. Their children were of/marriageable age during that time period - so one heading might be "Marriages - Mills County, Iowa, (Duncan)" with the time period written underneath. Sinca my Craven fanily also lived in that area during the same period, a second page would be made for this problem.

By keeping the two families separate, the record can gither be filed by surname or locality.

As your research progresses, the headings will be more specific, such as "Marriage John Duncan-Artie Kelier, about 1875 to 1890."

By this time 1 know that the fanily moved to Saunders County, Nebraska, about 1881 and that there $1 s$ no marriage records in either Mills or Saunders counties for this couple. This can be indicated by a simple notation such as "Mills County, lowa - 0."

I also know that Artie Keller was from the Geatrice or fairbury area in Nebraska, so I should make a note to chack Gage and jefferson counties.

The advantage of using this systen is that you can select individual pages to carry to research sites. If you need to put your work aside for a time, you can easily pick it up again without backtracking.

Pages can be arranged to fit your particular research needs; filing and retriaving data are easier.
