Portions of a letter written by Lucy Hatch LaMotte to her son Major Joseph LaMotte

Georgetown 19 Dec 1857

My Dear Son, Last week I had the pleasure of a letter from yourself, and was very glad to hear all were well, and am very glad to say we also are in the enjoyment of that blessing. Caroline's health I think has improved considerably by her visit to North Carolina, she certainly has gained strength. She was quite debilitated shen she left here last August.

I have not heard from Eveline & Margarett for some weeks but hope to hear from them soon. I suppose the distress caused by the failures and suspensions of the banks is felt severly in Texas, as well as all over the Country.

I had a letter yesterday from Joseph Hatch, your Uncle Richard's son, he is living in Duplin County. He says there is great distress in that section of the country, even amongst the farming community and he fears the consequences, says if matters should be worse, which will certainly be, there will be a good deal of property sold and at great sacrifice. There are now a good many Negroes now advertised for sale - that kind of property has fallen very much. I did not see Joseph when I was in North Carolina last, he writes me his health is not good.

Cousin Needham Whitfield and some of his children passed through Wilmington three weeks ago on their way to his son's wedding. He has married Mr. James Old-fields Daughter in Lenoir County. I should have been pleased to have had the pleasure to have seen them, you know they are a part of my relations that I esteem very highly.

Mrs. Hill (Maria) showed me a letter from Mr. Lemuel Hatch, he has two daughters married, he mentions his brother Alfred's family all well. I suppose A. H. (Alfred) thinks he feels the pressure of the money matters. He may not find as ready sele for his cotton, perhaps but it is nothing with him who has already so much that he hardly knows what to do with his money. It may cause him some uneasiness concerning large amounts he has at interest.

Mr. George Whitfield has a daughter married and living at Montgomery, Alabama. Her sister is not quite grown, is with her. He has two sons in Alabama, one is a lawyer, the other a doctor. He was in Florida when I was in Wayne, but spoke of moving to Alabama. The Whitfields often come on to Wayne to see the few of the family that remain there.

I had a letter from your aunt <u>Clarissa Hatch</u> a few days ago. She mentioned all the family were well. <u>Mrs. Hill</u>, her sister, had gone to Alabama to see and spend the winter with her brother, Mr. James Rhodes. Mr. Rhodes has two if not three children married.

Mr. Isaac Croom, formerly of Lenoir County, and nowliving in Greensborough, Alabama has given to the University of North Carolina 25 thousand dollars. I think you were acquainted with them.

I assure you I enjoyed my visit to Wayne very much, was very sorry I could not remain longer.....

Major LaMotte lived with his family in St. Louis, Missouri after returning from Mexico. He was very active in the Mexican Mar.

* Joseph Hatch was married to Anna Williams of Duplin Co. and they were grand parents of Cullen B. Hatch of Mount Olive.

Richard Blackledge Hatch married Clarissa Rhodes. Anna Maria Ward Hill, Clarissa and James Rhodes were the children of Gen James Rhodes and Anna Bass, daughter of Andrew Bass. Jøseph was the son of Clarissa.

Jones, William Lane, & Reubin Hynes--and no further prosecuted, whereof the said David, John, Charles, James, Charles, John, John, Uriah, Solomon and Francis is convicted and liable as to us appears of record, and have you the said monies at our next court to be held for the County of Wayne at the Court House in Waynesborough on the second Monday in April next, then and there to render the office the costs aforesaid. Herein fail not, and have you then and there this writ, witness James Cobb Clerk of our said court at his office this twelfth year of our Independance Anno Dom 1788--

Pursuant to an order of Court to us directed to regulate the working hands that work on the different roads north of Aycocks Swamp in Wayne County have met on the 23rd of September 1830 Begining at Horns Bridge the road from thence to Nathaniel Moors, all the lands in the bounds begining at sd bridge along sd road to Henry Horns land line Wm Horns line east of s^d road to the Hadleys road there
